Our speaker for October is WVGS member **Kerry**
Wymetalek. The topic will be **Meek's Cutoff & the**
Lost Blue Bucket Mine.

The **Meek Cutoff** was a covered wagon road that
branched off the Oregon Trail in northeastern Oregon.
First used in 1845, it left the main trail at Vale, Oregon,
and followed the Malheur River to head into the Harney
Basin. It then turned west towards Wagontire Mountain,
and north to the south fork of the Crooked River where it
split into two routes. Each path led to the Deschutes
River. The two routes reunited north of where the
Crooked River empties into the Deschutes and then con-
tinued to The Dalles, Oregon.

The road is named for frontiersman **Stephen Meek,**
who was hired to lead the first wagon train along it. The
journey was a particularly hard one, and many of the pio-
neers lost their lives.

While emigrants were driving their livestock through-
out the night to water, the John Herren family reportedly

found some **gold nuggets,** which led to the legend of the
Lost Blue Bucket Mine. The name came from the story
later circulated by some of the emigrants. The Herrens
reported that if they had remained at their campsite they
could have filled a blue bucket with gold nuggets. This
place has never been found, but if it exists it is thought by
some to be between Wagontire Mountain and the south
fork of the Crooked River.

The **Lost Blue Bucket Mine** is a lost mine reputed to
be located along the Meek Wagon Train trail between the
present day cities of Vale and The Dalles in Oregon. The
legend sparked a gold rush to the area of modern-day
Baker City, Oregon

The various versions of the legend tend to agree on a
few key points:

- Lost Oregon-bound emigrants discovered it in
summer 1845,
- The deposit is coarse placer gold in a dry stream
bed or canyon,
- The canyon is bottomed with lava pocked with
cavities and potholes.

Come join us for this interesting mystery in
Oregon History. Our programs are open to the
public.

September Program

Our September speaker was **Ellen Eisenberg** presenting a program on "**Jewish Oregonians**". She is the Dwight and Margaret Lear Professor of American History at Willamette University, where she has taught since 1990.

Jews were part of early Oregon history but not representative of East Coast Jews. There was no pre-existing hierarchy and no Jewish neighborhoods. Early Jews were generally merchants, and became involved in the community and politics. Besides Portland and Salem, they settled in towns like Jacksonville, Heppner, Burns and Albany.

Ellen showed many pictures of early Jews, stores, and parades with the Zionist flag displayed. Her talk was a very interesting study in how early Oregon Jews differed from the East Coast. Thank you, Ellen, it was informative and thoroughly enjoyable!

WVGS Collection

WVGS has a collection of books, CDs and microfilm and microfiche at Salem Public Library. Although we moved our materials there on June 1st of this year, our collection still has not been added to the Library's online catalog. Since our books are on the shelf in Dewey Decimal order, it is very difficult to find books on the shelf.

The Oregon State Library had sent us a copy of the database also. So in order to help volunteers and patrons use our collection, Deanne Smith and Liz Tice re-worked our database for our use. We now have two subject columns and the Excel database was re-sorted by subject.

There are two notebooks with print outs and the volunteer laptops also have the new databases. Available at the Genealogy Desk. You can look through the printouts and find all Oregon materials grouped together, by county, for example. We will add it to our website databases later.

Massachusetts Vital Records

One of the collections that the Oregon State Library gave to us was their set of **Massachusetts Vital Records to the year 1850**. These are invaluable in doing Early New England research, comprising all of the known records from the earliest times to about 1850. These were published early in the 20th century. Often there's nothing like looking at the records yourself!

When our collection is finally added to the online catalog, there will be only one entry for this whole collection. We now own 215 volumes for 176 Massachusetts town. You can come in and look through these for your ancestors.

Along with the vital records set, we also have all 17 volumes of **Massachusetts Soldiers and Sailors of the Revolutionary War**.

Sons of Norway

"The Princess and The President - The friendship between Crown Princess Martha of Norway and President Franklin D. Roosevelt". Presented by Roosevelt Historian Mr. Scott Larsen.

6:30 pm, Saturday, Oct. 10, 2015, Thor Lodge #42 Sons of Norway, Masonic Temple, 1625 Brush College Rd. NW, Salem OR.

The Crown Princess Martha of Norway, and her husband, Crown Prince Olaf, first met Franklin and Eleanor Roosevelt when they visited the United States in 1939. However, it was during the war years (1942–1945) that the friendship between the crown princess and the president grew. After Germany invaded Norway in 1940, Crown Princess Martha and her three children escaped, along with her husband, Crown Prince Olaf and King Haakon VII. The king and crown prince went to London with the Norwegian government-in-exile.

Crown Princess Martha and her three children first went to Sweden. Even though she was a former Swedish princess, some in Sweden believed her and her children compromised the country's neutrality by being in Sweden. The four royals and three staff members then traveled to Finland. At some point President Roosevelt invited Martha and her children to stay at the White House.

Scott Larsen is a Roosevelt Historian and will be delivering talks about FDR and Crown Princess Martha in the Pacific Northwest.

Julian/Gregorian Calendars

Calendar Switch and Double Dates

Beginning in 45 B.C., many parts of the world used the Julian calendar to mark the passage of time. By the Julian Calendar, March 25 was the first day of the year and each year was 365 days and 6 hours long. In 1582, Pope Gregory XIII determined that the Julian calendar was incorrect: each day was just a little bit too long and the human calendar wasn't keeping up with nature's calendar. To solve the problem, Pope Gregory XIII created what was known as the Gregorian Calendar. This new calendar changed the first day of the year to January 1.

The practice of double dating resulted from the switch from the Julian to the Gregorian calendar. Not all countries and people accepted this new calendar at the same time. England and the American colonies didn't officially accept it until 1752.

The changeover involved a series of steps:

- December 31, 1750 was followed by January 1, 1750 (under the "Old Style" calendar, December was the 10th month and January the 11th)
- March 24, 1750 was followed by March 25, 1751 (March 25 was the first day of the "Old Style" year)
- December 31, 1751 was followed by January 1, 1752 (the switch from March 25 to January 1 as the first day of the year)
- September 2, 1752 was followed by September 14, 1752 (drop of 11 days to conform to the Gregorian calendar)

Many people wrote dates falling between January 1 and March 25 with both years:

Out of context, it is sometimes hard to determine whether information in colonial records was entered "Old Style" or "New Style." Although current historical scholarship calls for retention of Old Style dates in transcriptions, historians and genealogists need to be aware that some people living at the time converted the date of an event, such as a birthday, from Old Style to New Style. George Washington, for example, was born on February 11, 1731 under the Julian Calendar, but afterwards recognized the date February 22, 1732 to reflect the Gregorian Calendar.
