Family Tree Maker to be retired!

Ancestry.com stunned the genealogy world with their announcement on December 8, 2015:

.... we've made the decision to stop selling Family Tree Maker as of December 31, 2015. Our subscription business and website, on the other hand, continue to grow and we are doubling down our efforts to make that experience even better for our Ancestry community.

Ancestry will continue to support current owners of Family Tree Maker at least through January 1, 2017. Replacing Family Tree Maker, Part 1: How to Scrub Your Data

Following the recent announcement of the "retirement" of Family Tree Maker, many users of that program are planning to switch to a product made by a different producer. Of course, anytime you move data from one program to another, maintaining both the accuracy and the completeness of that data is critical. Ben Sayer has written the first of a multi-part article that addresses the problems and offers suggestions as to "how to do it right."

Ben writes:

"That's the goal of this article: to help you identify areas where your FTM tree is non-GEDCOM compliant and start cleaning them up. Please note that this article is not about correcting factual errors in your tree."

The rather lengthy article contains numerous screenshots showing how all this is done. I will suggest that all Family Tree maker users should read Ben Sayer's article in the Genealogy Tools Blog at http://goo.gl/pJDh7G.

Danger to All Genealogy

This was from Tom St. Aubin in the *Ohio Genealogical Society Quarterly*. He did research on his wife's Revolutionary War ancestor, including "creative research".

"A danger to all genealogy is the on line pedigree chart which can be virally incorporated and then exponentially grows from family history file to family history file. Without one ounce of documentation, these charts pass misinformation rapidly, doing a disservice to our real ancestors. The principle of this article may be applied by all genealogists, what ever their level of expertise, no matter what State they are researching, do your own work.

View the original records yourself. Evaluate information yourself. Do not take even the experts word for your family history. They may be incorrect. No one can know your family like you."

Genealogists certainly do have a sense of humor. The following "sad news" was received from the Iowa Genealogical Society:

Des Moines, Iowa. Having faithfully served the genealogical community for almost 13 years, Heating Unit #1 of the Iowa Genealogical Society died in late November 2015. It will be missed by all. It began failing in early November and by the end of the month, the heating professionals removed life support, saying that it was unsafe. It is survived by its twin, Heating Unit #2, which continues to bear the burden of providing heat to the library, and cousins Units # 3,4,5 and 6 which support the remaining areas of the building.

In lieu of flowers, memorials may be sent to the Iowa Genealogical Society, 628 East Grand, Des Moines, IA 50309. Interment and replacement costs are estimated to be approximately \$8,000. The family is working with Mid American Energy to defray part of these costs.

Mortality Schedules on Ancestry.com

Part of the U.S. Federal Censuses from 1850-1880 included a mortality schedule enumerating the individuals who had died in the previous year. Because each of the censuses from 1850-1880 began on June 1, "previous year" refers to the 12 months preceding June 1, or June 1 (of the previous year) to May 31 (of the census year).

This database contains an index to individuals enumerated in these mortality schedules. In addition, each individual is linked to the census image on which they appear. Not all information that is recorded on the actual census is included in the index. Therefore, it is important that you view the image on which your ancestor is recorded to obtain all possible information about him/her. This database often included the names of the slave owners whose slaves had passed - please search in the 'Other' field to locate slave owners.

About State Censuses

In addition to the Federal Mortality Schedules, this database also includes Mortality Schedules from three State Censuses – Colorado, Florida, and Nebraska conducted in 1885. The federal act of 1879 that regulated the 1880 census also requested states and territories to conduct semi-decennial state censuses offering monetary compensation to those who did. Fifty percent of the amount states and territories paid supervisors and enumerators would be remunerated to the state or territory from the Federal Treasury on completion of the census. These records were later transferred from state archives to the National Archives.

Mortality schedules for **Oregon** are included for 1850-1880. **Oregon** is also included in Ancestry's census records for the **Dependent, Defective, and Delinquent Classes 1880 Census Schedules** and the **1890 Veterans Schedule.**
