#### September Program

Our speaker for September was **Tom O'Brien** from the Genealogical Forum in Portland. He spoke about **Geneanet**. Geneanet was launched in 1996 by genealogy enthusiasts to help family history researchers sharing their data. They have a forum to post questions and engage in discussions related to Geneanet specifically and genealogy in general. Geneanet is especially useful for those who have ancestors in Europe, and more specifically in France. The Geneanet members are sharing more than 400 million individuals in their Online Family Trees, suggestions for contacting other members, hundreds of thousands of free digitized archival records and hundreds of mostly free digitized registers are available. Geneanet members are also sharing their indexes for free and some genealogy society indexes are available in payed access. You will find hundreds of thousands of digitized books (payed access), postcards and family picture (free), a wiki, a blog, a genealogy community, etc. Tom gave an excellent demonstration of how to use Geneanet.

## Willamette Valley Genealogical Society's Family Tree DNA Project

- WVGS has a DNA Project for both men and women through <u>www.familytreedna.com</u>. If any of you have questions regarding DNA and which tests to order, please e-mail **Emily Aulicino** at: <u>aulicino@hevanet.com</u>. Emily is the WVGS Family Tree DNA Project Administrator. WVGS members (and non-members) receive a discounted DNA test rate rather than paying the full amount listed on the Family Tree DNA company's home page. According to Emily, "The company then gives the society a percentage of the sale for Y-DNA and mtDNA tests, **but not for SNP tests, Family Finder, nor any upgrades**.
- You can also get your DNA tested through the WVGS project, and then submit it to other groups. To receive the WVGS project's discount (and earn the WVGS a rebate), go to the WVGS website, <u>www.wvgsor.org</u>, click on the **Research** tab, and at the bottom of the page click on the **FamilyTreeDNA** logo to go to their website.

Their mission statement in part states that the organization is dedicated to the discovery, collection, preservation and dissemination of information related to the history, cultural her- itage, and genealogy of Germanic settlers in the Russian Empire and their descendants. The Society publishes the quarterly Journal of the American Historical Society of Germans from Russia. The AHSGR website is a good place to research these Germans. Augsburg University is a private liberal arts college in Minneapolis, Minnesota. Lindell Library is the aca- demic library of Augsburg University. Augsburg University's Lindell Library has recently completed a large digitization project of Folkebladet, a Norwegian newspaper that ran from 1877 to 1952. Considered the of- ficial newspaper of the Lutheran Free Church, the paper is an unparalleled resource for historians, genealo- gists, or anyone who is interested in reading Norwegian-American accounts from the past. Access it at: <u>archives.augsburg.edu/folkebladet-decade</u> . The issues are text searchable, or you can browse by date. The newspapers are sorted by decades from 1870s to 1950s. You can then narrow the newspapers down by month and date. Newspapers are fully viewable and searchable. Warning – it's in Nor-

## Ancestry.com Changed how it Determines Ethnicity and People are Upset!

There is an article by Marc Daalder in the Detroit Free Press that will interest genealogists. It starts: "Ancestry.com, the website better known for helping users create family trees, find distant family members and capture suspected serial killers, made a lot of customers angry last week.

"Recently, Ancestry has entered the business of DNA testing, which allows users to send a vial of spit to the company and receive in return a detailed genetic portfolio, including risk for some diseases and estimates of their ethnic ancestry.

"Neither the medical nor the heritage information are guaranteed to be 100 percent accurate, but as the science improves, so does the quality of the results. At least, that's what Ancestry insists.

"After Ancestry rolled out a new update to its ethnicity estimate system last week, users noticed dramatic changes in their ethnic profiles – some of which is inaccurate, customers say."

Later in the article, Marc Daalder also states:

"Other users said they were happy with the results or found that the new results better matched what they knew of their family history."

Comment by Dick Eastman: I am not convinced that the "new" Ancestry DNA results are inaccurate. I believe there is a strong possibility that the new results are much more accurate than the previous findings. In any case, if you had you DNA tested by Ancestry DNA, you might want to go back to the web site and check your results for any changes.

An Ancestry spokesperson told the Detroit Free Press, "Almost all of our 10 million users saw a change – whether it is seeing a region broken out into more detail (e.g. specifying Sweden or Norway instead of Scandinavia), a small increase or decrease in a percentage from one of their regions or a more substantial evolution."

## Greeks are not Italian!

And I'm one of those who doesn't agree with their "new" estimate!! My new DNA ethnicity is shown top right. My mother's parents were both born in Chios, Greece. My grandmother's parents were Greeks who had lived in Turkey and moved to Chios. My original ethnicity was 38% Greece and 13% Caucasus. My first cousin also used Ancestry.com's DNA test and his results were very similar to mine. This confirmed our mothers' common inheritance—the Koutsouradis were Greek and the Tsaggaris did come from Turkey.

I've been to the village of Halkios and met cousins. They don't' understand our interest in genealogy and, in general, don't understand Americans being such a mix of ethnicities (my father ancestors were German and English with a little very early Dutch thrown in). The family in Chios response to genealogy questions was "we're Greek and we have always been on Chios". Earthquakes and changes in governments make records hard to come by. But the family home has 1657 over the lintel and you can sit on Homer's Rock on Chios. I wouldn't dare tell them they are Italian.

I have nothing against Italians, but we are Greek!!

#### Library.

The 1927 census contains the veteran's name, his widow's name, her age and birth date, and their marriage date. The records are arranged by county, then alphabetically by the name of the widow. This series is not complete. Some of the returns are found in the Confederate **Pension Applications.** 

- The 1921 census provides each veteran's name, place and date of birth, place of residence, length of Alabama residence, occupation, wife's age and place of birth, marriage date and place, names of living children, occupation, and post office box. The forms also contain the veteran's rank, company, regiment, captain and colonel's name, battles, wounds, captures, imprisonments, and transfers.
- The 1907 census includes each person's name, place of residence, date and place of birth, rank, date of entry into military service, date and place of discharge or separation, and name of military unit. The 1907 lists have been abstracted, indexed, and published.
