- Nebraska Ancestree has been published quarterly by the Nebraska State Genealogical Society (NSGS) since 1978. Each issue includes articles on Nebraska history and families, vital record transcriptions, and other genealogical material. A helpful feature is that article titles usually include the county location. The NSGS website has a partially completed project underway to make publications over five years old available online. Volumes 1 to 22 are mostly available. https://nsgs.org/

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Salem Public Library Seismic and Safety Upgrade Project

At this time, no plans have been revealed. The Salem Public Library page still says:

- Temporary Library Relocation. This project will require us to temporarily relocate the Library to a during construction. We're looking now for the best location, considering input from our community.
- Construction. Work is scheduled to begin in early 2020 with the Library set to reopen in the summer of 2021.

The Lower Level of the Library will be used for staging. Anderson Rooms A and B will be closed to meetings beginning November 1, 2019. Our November and December meetings will be held at the VFW Hall on Hood St. NE.

[On July 22, 2019 Salem City Council approved a lease agreement for the Capital Press building, 1400 to 1440 Broadway NE, Salem, for Salem Public Library. The lease will be from November 1, 2019 to October 31, 2021.]

We will be waiting to hear what space we will have in the temporary space. We hope to maintain our genealogy help desk with volunteers.

Chemawa Cemetery Project

Years ago, WVGS members surveyed Chemawa Indian School Cemetery in Keizer, Oregon. An amazing job was done by walking the cemetery, going to the Oregon State Archives, using "Chemawa Register of Pupils" from the National Archives, Rigdon Colonial Chapel records, and newspapers (on microfilm the old way).

The results were published in Beaver Briefs in 1993-94. We also have kept the cemetery cards with notes.

With the internet, Ancestry.com, Find A Grave and other resources, we can find some more missing information. The volunteer on Find A Grave for Chemawa Cemetery is only photographing and posting the headstone information.

We have so much more information for most people buried there. A group of WVGS members volunteered to make a new database for our website and to submit some information to Find A Grave. We are working on that project now, not to make any money on the results but to provide information to families. Many children are buried there.

More than 70,000 Historical Records Added to Quebec City Municipal Archives Website Gail Dever, Genealogy à la carte http://genealogyalacarte.ca/

- The Quebec City municipal archives has digitized and recently made available online more than 70,000 historical records, such as maps, illustrations, architectural drawings, and 30,000 photos.
- This major improvement to its website coincides with the temporary move of the city's 400,000 archival records to a warehouse while the Gabrielle-Roy library, where they were housed, is being renovated.
- To ensure the public has online access to a significant portion of the archival collection, three employees have been digitizing records for the last four years.
- The documents will be returned to the library when the work is completed in early 2022. Editor's Note: Gail's post provides details on how to use the site and what searches are most applicable to genealogists, complete with illustrations! I managed to find contemporary photographs of the church where my great-great grandparents were married in 1828! (*The Ontario Genealogical Society*)
- While the website is in French, it can be easily navigated with an understanding of a few French words or by using Google Translate or the Chrome web browser to translate into English or any other language.
- The two key sections for genealogists on the Quebec City municipal archives website are Pages d'histoire (Pages of history) and Recherche d'archives (Search archives).

Yankee Publishing Acquires Family Tree Magazine

However, the US Family Tree Magazine has now been purchased by a major magazine publisher with a long history of publishing. Family Tree magazine now seems to have a bright future. Here is the announcement: **Dublin, NH (July 19, 2019) — Yankee Publish ing Inc.** (YPI), publisher of Yankee, The Old Farmer's Almanac, and New Hampshire magazine, announced its acquisition of Family Tree magazine

from F+W Media. "We're pleased to welcome Family Tree to YPI's family of products," said President and CEO Jamie Trowbridge. "Family Tree fits well with our suite of brands, both in terms of content and business strategy. We're excited to take this step to continue YPI's growth as an independent media company." Family Tree – with its print magazine, website, online classes and conferences, and web store – serves a passionate audience of genealogy enthusiasts. Interest in genealogy is surging in America, with over 20 million Americans having had their DNA tested by the four leading commercial ancestry and health databases, according to industry estimates.

Spotlight: Oregon Cemeteries by Valerie Beaudrault, Assistant Editor, **The Weekly Genealogist, American Ancestors**

The city of Ashland is located in Jackson County in southwestern Oregon. The city's website provides burials databases for its three cemeteries: Hargadine, Ashland, and Mountain View. More than 11,500 individuals are buried in these cemeteries.

- The first burials in Hargadine Cemetery took place in 1867. Hargadine was acquired by the city in 1989. The first burials in what became Ashland Cemetery took place in the 1850s. Nearly all of the cemetery came under city ownership in 1880. Mountain View Cemetery was established by the city of Ashland in 1904.
- The cemeteries are listed in the contents list on the left side of the webpage. Click the cemetery name and then the gravesite locator link, which will open a new page. Click the link on that page to begin. The database can be searched by last name, first name, "AKA" (also known as), date interred, and section/lot.
- A GIS Cemetery Viewer is provided. Search by name or birth/death year. The search results will show the location of the plot on a cemetery layout as well as the deceased's full name, cemetery name, and grave location. In many cases, a photograph of the gravestone or site location will appear on a pop-up panel.

Indiana county assessors were supposed to take a state census every six years starting in 1853. Ancestry's Red Book says enumerations were made at various intervals starting in 1820. Most of these incomplete originals are apparently at county archives. The Indiana State Library at Indianapolis has a few for 1931, 1919, 1913, 1901, 1889, 1883, 1877, 1871, and 1857. Many are also published in periodicals.

This is what *Family Tree Now* says:

- Family Tree Now is a site that aims to give users the best free tools possible in order to research their genealogy, look up information on other people, or merely find out what is available online about themselves. The service was launched in 2014.
- There's a wide variety of information you can use this service to find, including address, phone number, email address, name, phone, date of birth, associated relatives, public records (this could include birth records, marriage records, census records, death records, and other information available from public records databases).
- How is Family Tree Now Different? The most unique factor that sets Family Tree Now apart from other people search sites is the fact that all of the information here is available **for free** in one place, no registration required. Anyone who has just a first and last name is able to dig up anything: cell phone numbers, work information, relative's addresses, and a whole host of other information. This information is publicly available if you're willing to dig in and search for it at a variety of different sites, but Family Tree Now takes it quite a few steps further, putting it all in one place for free.
- You can "do research, build a family tree and discover your past" all in one place for free.

Here's what Kim Komando of USA Today says:

- The original purpose of Family Tree Now was to connect people to their distant relatives, thanks to comprehensive genealogical information. The site started raising eyebrows when people discovered their home addresses listed, along with the directions for how to get there. Strangers may also look up your telephone number and other person details.
- Most people leave a digital footprint. But Family Tree Now feels particularly invasive. What users find to be most eerie is that you don't even have to sign up or become a member to have your information listed on the site. It's already there for anyone to see, for free.
- Luckily, there's something you can do about it: there's a special Opt-Out Page, and if you follow the instructions, Family Tree Now should be able to process you request within 48 hours.
- Go to <u>familytreenow.com/optout</u>. Click the "Begin Opt-Out Procedure" button.
- You will be routed to a free search page. Run a search on yourself. Once you've found yourself, click on the record details. Verify that this record is, in fact, you and not someone else with the same or similar name.
- Once you're certain that it's your record, click the red "Opt Out This Record" button
