12 noon – 1 pm Program: Patrick Harris "Aurora Colony"

In 1853 William Keil sent ten scouts from Missouri who arrived at the then American controlled Fort Vancouver. Oregon had been declared an American Territory in 1848 but it was not until 1853 for Washington. Thus, the scouts were sent north and selected the Willapa Bay region. Keil arrived with his first migration in 1855 but he did not like the weather or the isolation on the coastline and regrouped his people in Portland where he met some of the first 1847 emigrants who were by then brining their apples and pears to the California market which they first were exposed to in 1848.

Keil purchased a saw and a flour mill from these settlers in 1856 in the prairie region and he named the site Aurora Mills after his daughter. From that year until the settlement of colony business in 1883 the Aurora community managed a Christian cooperative society at Aurora based on communal living, or the actual sharing of labor and property. Several previous writers have emphasized that Keil desired isolation for his community, but the actual records tell a completely different story of a community intimately involved in the political and social life of the Willamette Valley.

Patrick Harris has a master's degree in History from Portland State University (1981). He served as the Executive Director of the Aurora Colony Historical Society from 1983 to 1996 and then as ED at the Clackamas County Historical Society to March of 2006. He returned to Aurora as the Curator of Collections that year and continues there to this day.

Dues for 2020

On the recommendation of the Executive Board, members decided at the September meeting that an increase in dues for 2020 was not needed. Annual dues will remain at \$25 for an individual or \$30 family membership.

However, relying on donations each year is not a reliable amount.

A suggestion was made to reduce the pro-rated rates for dues. Currently our By-laws specify:

SINGLE Apr-Jun: \$18.75 Jul-Sept: \$12.50 Oct-Dec: \$6.25

FAMILY Apr-Jun: \$22.50 Jul-Sept: \$15.00 Oct-Dec: \$7.50

This would require a change to the by-laws so the Executive Board will consider the change at the next meeting with a recommendation for the membership.

Land Records

September Program WVGS member Jim Johnson was our speaker for September. He talked about the value of land records to genealogists. You need to know where to look for the records, knowing the period of time they lived there and the courthouse that housed the records (not necessarily the same county now). You can find other families nearby, often discovering a wife's maiden name. Abstracts of titles also including an amazing about of

What can I find in US Land Records?

- Deeds can provide many clues about your ancestor and their family. An individual may have sold land to their children or siblings. A deed may show the distribution of land of a deceased parent to their children as an inheritance (then check probate records, also).
- The sale of a piece of property may give the first name of the wife (then look for marriage records).
- A deed may mention the previous county and state of residence or a new county or state of residence.
 Deads often give the names of adjacent preparty owners, who might be parents, cousing, children, or
- Deeds often give the names of adjacent property owners, who might be parents, cousins, children, or family friends.
- Land records may also show if he had served in the military, or if he was a naturalized citizen.
- A deed could show the settlement of a probate decree, a sale by court order, a separation between two individuals, or may mention different types of relationships.
- Many civil suits are found in deeds—over half of the lawsuits in America before 1850 had something to do with land (check court records). Federal land patents may also be found recorded in county deed books.
- Land records can help separate individuals or families with the same surname.
- Information from land records will lead to other types of records to search, such as probate or court records, marriage records, military records, or immigration and naturalization records.

To find online land records

- Oregon State Archives Women's Property Index
- Oregon State Archives Land Claim Index
- Genealogical Forum of Oregon Land Claims Index
- At Ancestry.com, search the entire land records category.
- Do a Google search by typing your county and state with the words "online land records" after the name
 of the state being searched.
- Search strategies
 - Deed books will have one index for grantees and another for grantors. It is important to search both the grantee and grantor index, as much can be learned by looking at both the purchases and the sales.
 - Study the index system carefully to see how it is organized. Sometimes, surnames are grouped together by the first letter of the last name and are not in strict alphabetical order after that. In some deed indexes, names are also indexed by the first letter of the first name.
 - Take note about whether or not a landowner sold the same amount of acreage he originally purchased. If he sold more land than he purchased, he may have inherited some land or acquired land through marriage. If he purchased more land than he sold, find out what happened to the rest of the land.
 - Look carefully at deeds of people with the same surnames in the county you are searching, as these people may be related.
- Check BLM for homestead records, https://glorecords.blm.gov/default.aspx Bureau of Land Management (BLM), General Land Office (GLO) Records Automation provides live access to Federal land conveyance records for the Public Land States. https://www.blm.gov/or/landrecords.php provides access to more Oregon and Washington land records.
- Don't forget the National Archives for the complete Land Entry files!
