"Ghosts in the attic" is the lead for a Corvallis Gazette-Times article written by Bennett Hall March 27, 2016. The story was about the Mobile Veterans Museum stored at and displayed at and from the Marion Post 661 Veterans of Foreign Wars Building. The title was appropriate as the building does creak with age.

The Building itself; though not an ancient building as some in Salem are, was constructed by veterans for veterans. The builders were craftsman of the time and all were Spanish American War and WWI veterans and their families. Marion Post was named after the name of the county of its' location as were many Posts of the time. It was formed and chartered almost 99 years ago (The Post birthday is March 16th). The land was donated by a member and the materials were purchased with funds donated by the membership. The actual construction began in 1938 and was completed by 1940. Virgil T Golden, a decorated WWI Army veteran and successful businessman in the community was an active member and contributor to Marion Post. Recently his grandson brought in his military records and pictures. This started a movement to reproduce Virgil's Army Uniform for the display and research into his family history. Others have done this research as well, so I am leaning on their efforts and expertise.

Kerry Wymetalek: "I was born in Pendleton OR the second of fraternal twins. My family moved to Portland and within a couple years, the State dismantled my family. The older kids went to a foster family and the younger ones went to different foster families and then to adoption. My twin and I were adopted together. We lived in Portland, then Sauvies Island, then Portland again.

After the Columbus Day storm in the early sixties, we moved to Seaside. Early on my adopted family introduced us to the coast and it stuck. I learned about the sea, earned my income from the sea and realized early my career would be in the Navy. I served all over the world because of the Navy and became interested in other cultures. After serving my required service I left active duty and attended Oregon State University and earned a Bachelor of Science degree in Anthropology. While earning my degree, I began to research my family heritage. I also was an active member of an adoptive rights group and testified before committees in the Oregon Legislature. In 1982, while researching I found record of my birth and my birth surname and, soon after, my birth mother and most of my siblings. Last year we found our last missing sister because of DNA testing.

ARTICLE XV AMENDMENTS

Section 1 This Constitution may be amended by a two-thirds vote of the membership in attendance at any regular meeting, provided that the notice with the proposed changes is sent out at least ten (10) days in advance of that meeting.

ARTICLE III MEMBERSHIP

Section 2 The membership year shall be from January 1st through December 31st. Dues will be pro-rated for members joining after March 31st. (eliminate this sentence)

Standing Rules:

ARTICLE IX STANDING RULES

Section 3 The Standing Rules may be amended by a majority vote of the members in attendance at any regular meeting, provided that the notice with the proposed changes is sent to members at least ten (10) days in advance of that meeting.

Section 2 Membership Policies:

B. The membership year is from January 1 through December 31. Dues shall be pro-rated as follows: members joining April 1st through June 30th pay ¾ of annual dues, members joining July 1st through September 30th pay ½ of annual dues, and members joining October 1st through December 31st pay ¼ of annual dues. (Eliminate this sentence). Members joining at any time during the year pay the full amount of annual dues. (add this sentence).

Aurora Colony

October Program

Patrick Harris was our speaker for October, talking about the history of the Aurora Colony in Aurora, Oregon. Patrick is the Executive Director of the Aurora Colony Historical Society. Patrick was very knowledgeable about the history of the colony which was established by leader William Keil as a Christian communal community. William Keil was the leader for almost 40 years. Patrick gave a very interesting talk, enjoyed by everyone.

A Christian Communal Society

Nearly 600 people, almost all German and Swiss emigrants, established and lived in the Aurora Colony, a Christian communal society, from 1856 to 1883. Christian communal living in the Aurora Colony was carried out by individuals who were members of specific family groups, and this was notably unlike other Christian colonies that practiced celibacy.

Known by his followers as Father Keil and as Dr. Keil and King Keil to others, Wilhelm Keil was the leader of one of the most successful nineteenth-century utopian community experiments west of the Rocky Mountains. He was born in Bleicherode, Prussia in 1812. In 1836, he married Louisa Reiter, and the couple embarked for America soon after.

Keil went through a series of religious transformations but ultimately denounced all organized religion and sought to establish his own belief system among a group of devoted followers. In 1844, Keil sent scouts to find a location for a Christian community devoted to the Golden Rule. Later that year he established the colony of Bethel in Shelby County, Missouri.

After ten years in Missouri, Keil saw encroaching civilization as a threat to his colony, so he once again sent out scouts to find a suitable location for a new colony, this time in the Pacific Northwest. The group selected a site on the Willapa River in Washington Territory, and Keil led a group of eighty individuals there in 1855. The lead wagon was the hearse for Keil's oldest son, Willie, who had died shortly before the trip began.

After arriving at Willapa, Keil rejected the site as it was too remote and isolated for commercial opportunities. He and most of those who came from Missouri moved to Portland, where he learned there was land available twenty-five miles to the south in the Willamette Valley. In 1856, he established a new colony there named for his daughter Aurora.

For twenty-one years, Keil led the community as it built a hotel, church, and other buildings and became successful in developing crops and orchards. The community held true to its basic Christopia.

tian beliefs, but Keil's isolationist view transformed into an understanding of the economic role the community could play in providing goods and products to the Willamette Valley's growing population. Among those products was the excellent food served at the Aurora Hotel and the music of the Aurora bands. Keil was instrumental in bringing the railroad to Aurora in the early 1870s as a way to connect Aurora with other cities.

Keil remained the leader of Aurora, and nominally of Bethel, until his death in December 1877. Soon after his death, efforts began to disband the two colonies, with the final dissolution taking place in 1883.

Susan Bell 1933-2019

WVGS lost a long time member on September 26, 2019. Sue Bell became a member in 1982 and was the Beaver Briefs editor for a total of about 21 years. Writing all the articles by hand (they were typed up, copied and mailed by Sherrill A. Hochspeier), she planned the Beaver Briefs content for years in advance down to the color of the covers. When Sue did retire, she left us a folder with many partial articles and ideas.

Sue also held various offices over the years, but she was known for her knowledge of Marion County history, even though she was not a native Oregonian. She was born in California, lived in Hawaii with her husband Bill Bell and children, and then moved to Salem in 1981.

Sue always amazed me with her historical knowledge, which I suspected was her real interest rather than genealogy. We do have a book in our family history collection at Candalaria that she wrote about two great-great-aunts "Kate & Ida (Weber): two Victorian ladies".

Sue was an active member for many years. Besides Beaver Briefs she researched and edited many of our publications, including "The Asylum Cemetery" in 1991 and "St. Barbara's Cemetery" in 2006. Sue was always professional, cheerful and helpful in finding that misplaced comma. A loss of a wonderful person to us and her family. Her obituary can be found in the *Statesman Journal*, 6 October 2019 or through the Virgil T. Golden Funeral Service online.
