A business meeting will be held to conduct society business.


12 noon - 1 pm Program: Dave Bruey, WVGS Member:

Bringing Our Family Trees to Life:

Building Family Histories from Genealogical Facts

Dave will present ways he has found to infuse historical context into the life stories of his ancestors. We will review some different kinds of genealogy reports including one that Dave has developed for his purposes, will see a procedure anyone might use to add more meaning and interest to their genealogical records, and will practice recognizing the personal stories lurking within some actual family group sheets.

David Bruey is a member of the Willamette Valley Genealogical Society and volunteers at the Salem Public Library genealogy help desk. He is also a volunteer photographer for Find-A-Grave.com. He has completed twenty-four genealogy courses to date. Dave became interested in family history while in high school but could pursue that interest only sporadically during the decades that he was working as a university administrator and raising four children with his wife of fifty years. Since retiring he has been writing a book to be published later in 2020 on his greatgrandmother's ancestry from the late 1500s in England to



the 1800s in Ohio.

Genealogical Scholarship Information

Last year WVGS launched a new and exciting program to fund scholarships that will benefit all members of our society. The Society will fund up to four scholarships per year for members to take genealogy courses. After completing a course, the recipient will share his or her knowledge with other members at a WVGS monthly meeting. The courses are offered by the National Institute for Genealogical Studies (NIGS). You can view its many course offerings at https://www.genealogicalstudies.com/

Each scholarship recipient will be able to choose from a range of options how best to share his or her knowledge with the membership. The list of options is presently being developed for member approval. For example, a recipient might present a program, or report on the most valuable lessons learned, or distribute a written summary of the main ideas in the course, or lead a member discussion of the subject of the course. Help will be available happily to any scholarship recipient who wants assistance in sharing his or her information.

Salem Public Library's move to temporary quarters

Salem Public Library staff and our partners are managing many changes as we prepare to temporarily move to 1400 Broadway NE while the Main Library at 585 Liberty St. SE is renovated. One thing is not changing—our commitment to our community and to providing friendly, welcoming service accessible to all. The Main Salem Public Library at 585 Liberty St. SE will have its **last open day February 2, 2020** before closing for construction.

Salem Public Library at Broadway will **open February 18, 2020 at 1400 Broadway St. NE**, to serve during construction, offering:

- Browsing collections for Adults, Teens, and Children
- New books and other materials
- Hold pick-up and assistance with placing holds
- Public-use computers, scanners, and printing for all ages
- Wireless internet access
- Weekly storytimes

How this affects Willamette Valley Genealogical Society

- WVGS **will** still have a volunteer desk to help patrons with free genealogy assistance at the temporary library site. Our hours will be the same: 11 am to 5 pm Tuesday through Saturday and 1 pm to 4 pm on Sunday.
- Salem Public Library expects the renovations to last two to three years.
- The temporary location on Broadway NE is about one-third the size of the library's current space.
- WVGS's book collection of genealogy books (which belongs to the society, not to the library) will have to be put in storage. WVGS members will box the books (boxes provided by the Library) and they will be stored with other library materials being stored.
- WVGS will still have materials stored at Candalaria Terrace where we rent space. Volunteers will have to mainly rely on computers and the internet.
- We won't be purchasing new books during this time.


Genealogy Classes 2020

Oregon Index Online

The State Library of Oregon recently celebrated the Oregon Index going online. This has been a **major** project of the library.

"The Oregon Index was compiled by State Library staff and volunteers starting in the early 20th century and continuing to the mid-1980s. It contains over 700,000 cards with citations to articles published in Oregon newspapers, magazines, book chapters, and more. Topics cover events and issues important to Oregon history and state government.

In some cases, the cards use archaic language that may have been considered appropriate in the context of the time when the citations were created, but may be jarring to library users today. The cards have been digitized and posted without altering the content.

See the Oregon Index Online Guide for more searching and background information The resources that are indexed may be, but are not necessarily, found in the State Library collections. Try searching the State Library Catalog or WorldCat for book, magazine, or newspaper titles, or contact us for assistance.

The organization of the digitized cards reflects the physical drawers in the State Library building. Drawers 001 through 196 contain biographical cards, and drawers 200 through 660 contain subject cards. You can browse by drawer or search by using the "Search this Collection" box."



Introducing the Record Group Explorer

With billions of pages of records, there's no question that the holdings of the National Archives are vast. The breadth can be intimidating to researchers and online users, especially first-time users, who may not have familiarity with the organization and management of archival material.

That's why we are excited to announce a new tool to help you navigate the universe of records held at the National Archives: the Record Group Explorer.



This data visualization allows you to browse NARA's holdings by Record Group. You can use it to get a sense of the scale and organization of records at the National Archives and to explore what is available online via the National Archives Catalog. Click any of the blue boxes to see an overview of the scans available online, and find links to the Catalog, organized by format.

Each Record Group page has a progress bar that provides an estimate of the percentage of textual pages that are currently available online. Want to join us as a Citizen Archivist? Follow the link on each Record Group page to learn more about tagging and transcribing historical records in our Catalog to make them more searchable and accessible.

Record Group Explorer:

Welcome to the NARA's Record Group Explorer. Permanent federal records held by NARA are organized into numbered Record Groups comprising the records of a major government entity, usually a bureau or an independent agency.

0.815%:

As of December 2019, there are 93,350,971 scans online representing 0.815% of the estimated total number of textual pages in NARA's holdings.

The National Archives is working on putting their records online and it is worth looking at this Record Group Explorer. It is much easier now to see what has been scanned and to look at the images. There are no indexes so you have to browse.

For example, clicking on RG 75 Bureau of Indian Affairs, you can browse Textural Records, Maps or Photographs.
