The Main Salem Public Library at 585 Liberty St. SE will have its **last open day February 2, 2020** before closing for construction. Salem Public Library at Broadway will **open February 18, 2020 at 1400 Broadway St. NE**, to serve during construction.

How this affects Willamette Valley Genealogical Society

- WVGS **will** still have a volunteer desk to help patrons with free genealogy assistance at the temporary library site. Our hours will be the same: 11 am to 5 pm Tuesday through Saturday and 1 pm to 4 pm on Sunday.
- Salem Public Library expects the renovations to last two to three years.
- The temporary location on Broadway NE is about one-third the size of the library's current space.
- WVGS's book collection of genealogy books (which belongs to the society, not to the library) will have to be put in storage. WVGS members will box the books (boxes provided by the Library) and they will be stored with other library materials being stored.
- WVGS will still have materials stored at Candalaria Terrace where we rent space. Volunteers will have to mainly rely on computers and the internet.
- We won't be purchasing new books during this time.
- Our genealogy help desk is closed as of January 21st, 2020 and will reopen at 1400 Broadway NE on February 18th, 2020.
- Volunteers and hours will remain the same.

Ellis Island immigrants

Ellis Island was the gateway for more than 12 million immigrants who passed through its doors seeking a better future in America, from 1892 to 1954. The rich tapestry of cultures and nationalities who entered the new world there are revealed in these timeless photos taken between 1902-1913.

The photographs, from the collection of William Williams, Commissioner of Immigration at Ellis Island from 1902-5 and 1909-13, have only been recently digitized and made available to the public by the New York Public Library. The portraits were made by Augustus Sherman and the photos of Ellis Island were taken by Edwin Levick.

Portraits of a Guadeloupean woman and of an Albanian soldier by Sherman, who worked as the Chief Registry Clerk at Ellis Island until his retirement in 1917.

In the News:

• If you have ever wanted to trace your family's immigration history, you should do it now—accessing genealogical records from the 1800s and 1900s may soon become far more expensive than ever before.

U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Services (USCIS) is planning to increase its fees to access millions of historical records held under the agency's Genealogy Program. This includes citizenship and alien registration files, naturalization records, visa applications, and other documents.

In some cases, the fees to access these files would triple. In other instances, the fees would increase by nearly 500%, shooting up from **\$130 to \$625 to obtain a single paper file.**

From the USCIS

- The USCIS Genealogy Program is authorized to make five series of the agency's historical records available to requesters. Other agency records may be available from the USCIS Freedom of Information (FOIA) Program, or may have transferred to the National Archives.
- To request a record or file you MUST provide a file number.
- Details on Available Series: Certificate Files, September 27, 1906 March 31, 1956; Alien Registration Forms on Microfilm, 1940 - 1944; Visa Files, July 1, 1924 - March 31, 1944; Registry Files, March 2, 1929 -March 31, 1944
- Requests are accepted online as well as through the mail. Please read our Records Frequently Asked Questions and Common Errors section before submitting a request. Answers can also be found in our "Help" section.

State Censuses

MICHIGAN State, Territorial, and Colonial Censuses

Michigan took censuses in different years than the federal censuses. These censuses may have different data compared to federal censuses. Check these censuses for more information on a family. Most state, territorial, and colonial censuses are at the Michigan State Archives.

1904 Lost

- **1894** State census. Includes population, mortality, agricultural, industrial, social statistics, or veterans' schedules in Allegan, Barry, Bay, Benzie, Dickinson, Emmet, Gratiot, Hillsdale, Ingham, Iosco, Isabella, Jackson, Kalamazoo, Kent, Keweenaw, Lapeer, Lenawee, Livingston, Menominee, Midland, Montcalm, Muskegon, Newaygo, Ottawa, St. Clair, St. Joseph, and Washtenaw counties.
- **1888** Civil War veterans only
- **1862-1886** Military levy annual statewide county censuses mostly lost; a few rarely at county clerks' offices.
- **1884** State census Includes population, mortality, agricultural, industrial, or social statistics schedules in Barry, Bay, Benzie, Emmet, Hillsdale, Ingham, Isabella, Jackson, Kalamazoo, Kent, Keweenaw, Lake, Lapeer, Leelanau, Lenawee, Menominee, Montcalm, Muskegon, Newaygo, Ottawa, Roscommon, St. Clair, St. Joseph, Van Buren (Paw Paw Twp.), Washtenaw, Wayne, and Wexford counties.
- **1874** State census Only males over 21 years by name, and females in age categories in population schedules for Eaton and Houton counties only. Eaton also includes agricultural and industrial schedules
- **1864** State census Only males over 21 years by name, and females in age categories in population, agricultural and industrial schedules in Clinton, Eaton, (Houghton population only), and Newaygo counties.
- **1854** State census Only males over 21 years

by name, and females in age categories in population, agricultural, and industrial schedules for Eaton County. For details see Barnett.

- **1845** State census Only males over 21 years by name, and females in age categories in Eaton, Lenawee, Oakland, St. Clair, St. Joseph, Van Buren, and Washtenaw counties.
- **1837** State census. Tallies only; individual names not included except in Kalamazoo County.
- **1834** Territorial census. Tallies only; individual names not included except in Crawford County (now Wisconsin), and Lenawee County
- **1827** Territorial census mostly lost. Surviving fragments for Wayne (Detroit), Monroe (Lawrence Twp.), and Washtenaw counties
- **1810** Territorial census, Detroit, and Michilimackinac (everything north of Saginaw Bay)
- 1805/1806 Territorial census, Detroit
- 1796 Colonial census, Detroit
- **1792** Colonial census, Petite Côte (south shore of Detroit River
