Document Research

Searches for the following Oregon documents can be done. If successful, the fee is \$10.00 per document or 3 for \$20.00 for nonmembers and \$5.00 per document or 3 for \$10.00 for WVGS members. If these require a trip to the Oregon State Archives, Marion County Clerk's Office or other off-sites, the fee is \$10.00 per document for members and non-members (3 for \$10/\$20 does not apply). The \$5 and \$10 charges include postage for 5 pages or less. If over 5 pages there will be a charge for postage and handling. Obituaries from the Salem Capital Journal, Oregon Statesman, Statesman Journal, Portland Oregonian and other Oregon newspapers, as available

- Published biographical and historical volumes.
- Marriage and birth records as available.
- Oregon naturalization, probate, and military records as available.
- Copy of Oregon Death Certificate (1903-1969).
- Copy of delayed Oregon birth certificates as available.
- Copy of Oregon birth certificates mid-1903-1919, as available.

General Research

We will conduct searches using resources such as Ancestry.com, censuses, city directories, Oregon Donation Land Claims, newspapers, and other sources such as those listed above and below. **General research is not restricted to Oregon only!** The minimum fee for research is \$10, if successful. This includes a copy of one document. Research is \$10 per hour, \$5 for each additional 1/2 hour and the cost of additional documents. The \$5 and \$10 charges include postage for 5 pages or less. If over 5 pages there will be a charge for postage and handling.

Plans for 2020

Plans for 2020

1: Get Organized

- Get organized because being clear about your goals will get you a lot further.
- Start now by making a weekly list of goals –
 people to research, records to finds, tasks to
 complete and check them off as you complete them each day.
- Each and every week, use your first 15
 minutes to get organized for the rest of that
 week's days and make use of your organization system to stay on top of your plan

2: Focus On and Fact-Check Only One Ancestor

 Trying to work on more than one ancestor may prove overwhelming. A better use of your time would be to focus on only one family member each day and progress through your tree in an organized fashion with each additional day.

3: Start a Log for Future Research

- Most family historians have learned (sometimes the hard way) that proper planning is key to fruitful research. Picking a database or website at random and searching page by page for familiar surnames is frustrating and, frankly, a waste of your valuable time. Instead, use your time to list sources for future research using a research log.
- The value of a research log is the organization and tracking of what sources have and have not been reviewed or found. A typical log includes the date you reviewed a source, the place you found it, the purpose of your search, the library call number or other reference information, and the source itself, in addition to your findings.

4: Follow the Leads

- Even the most old-school family historian appreciates the hints that programs like MyHeritage, Ancestry and FamilySearch provide to alert researchers to new records that have been added to their vast databases or discovered based on updated search algorithms. Your fifteen-minute research window is a great time to review some of the leads these hints provide.
- Remember, though, that no hint should be accepted blindly. Just because Ancestry suggests that the Ben Jones in a record might be your Benjamin A. Jones, Jr. doesn't automatically confirm that it's a match.

5: Brush Up on Your Skills

- Use this time to learn a little more about what's new in genealogy research. Read helpful articles or catch a quick podcast or YouTube video from Family Tree Magazine or Lisa Louise Cooke's Genealogy Gems series. You might also like to take an online genealogy course.
- Even the most seasoned genealogists can pick up a new tip or trick from another pro every now and then!

Pandemicss

The Deschutes Historical Museum reminds us that our ancestors went through the same type of pandemic that we are going through, and survived!

This article from The Bend Bulletin, November 3, 1917 reminds us that quarantine used to be the order of the day to prevent a range of diseases like Smallpox, Scarlett Fever, and Influenza from spread-

EPIDEMIC OF FEVER SPREADS

SIX CASES REPORTED—SCHOOLS
FUMIGATED TODAY—QUARANTINE MEETS WITH OPPOSITION
—DOCTORS NOT CALLED.

Six cases of scarlet fever are now under quarantine in Bend, three having been reported since yesterday. In order to check the epidemic to some extent in the schools all the buildings were fumigated today. Chief of Police Nixon, acting as exofficio health officer, placed quarantine on several dwellings in the neighborhood of Florida and Bond streets where several people have been suffering from the disease and failed to call in medical attention.

Doctors have found considerable opposition to the quarantine and believe this is responsible for the failure to report cases. A vigorous watch is being kept on certain neighborhoods thought to have been subject to infection and violations of the quarantine will be penalized. So far as is known in addition to the first three cases reported and which are now on the road to recovery, there are two others under treatment.

Looking Ahead: The 1950 Census

Mark your calendars: the 1950 Census is scheduled to come out on April 1, 2022, 72 years to the day after it was taken. That's still a couple of years away.

The 1950 census asked fewer questions than the 1940 census died. The enumeration recorded responses to just 20 questions, including name, age, address, relationship to head of household, marital status, state or country of birth, occupation and (if foreign-born) whether a naturalized US citizen. A 5-percent sample was asked additional questions.

When it was released in 2012, the 1940 census was placed online and made available for free, but indexes took several months to be created. The release of the 1950 census will probably follow the same pattern.

MISSOURI State, territorial, and colonial censuses

The Territory of Missouri took censuses in 1814, 1817, and 1819. The State of Missouri took censuses in 1821, then every four years beginning in 1824 through 1868, and in 1876. Most of these Territorial and State Censuses no longer exist. Listed below are copies currently available. Some censuses only gave head of household and others listed all household members.

Coming Soon to our website

We will soon have scanned images of a collection of Oregon Marriage Licenses for marriages performed by a Methodist minister in Oregon, years covered from 1911 to 1996. An index will also be posted.

A marriage license is a government document that is needed to get approval before marrying. A marriage license means a couple is allowed to get married, not that they are married. During a wedding ceremony, participants and 1-2 witnesses sign the license. Marriage licenses were good for 30-60 days,

We have scanned some licenses from the United Methodist Church Archives. Oregon Archives are located at the MI-CAH Building at the Salem's 1st United Methodist Church, 600 State Street, Salem, OR 97301. Marriage licenses were from marriages performed by Methodist ministers around Oregon. Years range from 1907 to 2001. Licenses are not a marriage certificate.
