President's Report for May 8, 2021

The General Meeting scheduled for May 8th was cancelled due to the continuing COVID-19 pandemic. Members were notified in the May newsletter that the meeting had been cancelled. The Executive Board did meet on May 6, 2021.

1. Treasurer's report: Barbara Foster compiled a Treasurer's report for the month of April. For April 2021: Income for Operations was from donations \$415, research \$244.10 for a total income for the month of \$659.10. Expenses for operations were rent at Candalaria \$344.21, total expenses -\$344.21. BALANCE of checking and savings on March 31, 2021 was \$32,577.84. Thank you to Claudine Shaw and Thomas Branigar for donations and Tony Hoff for continuing to do research for us.
2. Membership Report from Sue Rempel: We have 2 Societies, 20 Life members, 13 families/26 members, and 83 singles for 118 memberships or 131 members. New members Lois Hadley of Hillsboro, Loreen Wells of Salem, Cody Jones of Buckley, WA, Allison Bowers of Qualicum Beach, BC, Dave Obee of Victoria, BC, Cindy Gell of Courtenay, BC
3. Meetings and speaker were cancelled. We planned a Zoom meeting on May 8th. The May 8th Zoom meeting was cancelled since the host Doug Crosby was unavailable. The Genealogy Treasure Hunt will be from April 16, 2021 to June 1, 2021. Rules and Questions were posted on the website as well as sent by email to members.
4. Salem Public Library is closed. Volunteers will not be at the desk. The Library is scheduled to start moving back to the Library building in May. Opening depends on the pandemic.
5. Deanne Smith has been working on an index to issues 40-49 for Beaver Briefs. We will only print 2 copies, one for us and one for use in the library.
6. Corresponding Secretary Tony Hoff reported "We received 4 research requests in April, all to our society. There were requests for 7 obituaries, 2 marriage records, a death certificate and to verify the parents of an ancestor." He has also been working on research for members.
7. Dennis Hill—kept the website updated, as well as the password list for new members.
8. New Business- Members have been using Find My Past and NYG&B, one at a time.
We will have a new class at the Senior Center when it opens, based on 5 regions of the US using Family Tree Magazine's state hand-outs..
9. Old business – we need to set up a Pay Pal account.

Research



Research

What happens to our genealogy research when we die?

Don't let your hard-earned genealogy research get thrown away when you're gone! If your kids or other family members aren't interested in your research, donating it to a library can be a good way to preserve it so it can assist generations of family historians to come. However, there are a few pointers you should keep in mind when donating. Libraries have limited space and resources, and it's not guaranteed that they'll accept the donation.

1. Organize your research before you donate it. Unorganized research will be thrown out!
2. Find a suitable library, archive, or historical or genealogical society.
Find out what they will do with it.
3. Put it in your will. Family may not know what your plans were.
4. Make a family tree. This is easier now with software or online programs.

Well documented and organized genealogy and family history, in physical and digital formats, can be shared with many different people and organizations. Be aware that there are restrictions to the types of donated genealogy, family history and family heirlooms depending on the requirements of the institution or group you want to give to.

Ensuring that your own original research material 'goes to a good home' at your demise is essential to it not being destroyed. Be sure that you work hard to find a recipient who will appreciate it. Finding a person to take over the research is a far better idea, or appointing a trusted friend or family member who is interested in family history.

Know anyone researching these names?

Regarding the article above, WVGS receives requests concerning research that needs to be passed on. **We have no room to store files.** So:

A good genealogist:

1. Finds every document possible on an ancestor. He/she does not stop at census and vital registrations but looks beyond to records such as land records, court records, military records, church records, immigration records, education records, newspaper articles, tax and assessment records, etc.
2. Learns what records have survived for the location and time period for each ancestor's life. Then learns where those records can be found - online and off.
3. Copies documents exactly as found, not as he/she thinks it should be.
4. Cites sources for all facts found. Citing your sources means others can look up what you have written, and verify for themselves. Sources means you've got proof of some kind to support your fact. **(future good genealogists will continue reading this article on page 6)**

Family History Library

As WVGS reaches out for new members we need to be aware of and use new strategies to get the attention of potential members. The majority of the next generation are comfortable with online media and use of the Internet. Signing up and communicating with our newest members should be quick and easy and allow them to participate within their scheduled time.

“Facebook is a website which allows users, who sign-up for free profiles, to connect with friends, work colleagues or people they don't know, online. It allows users to share pictures, music, videos, and articles, as well as their own thoughts and opinions with however many people they like.”

To sign up for a Facebook account, you need a name and a working email address or mobile phone number. You can use any name you are known by. However, if you run into a problem, you may have to provide an acceptable form of ID to verify it later.

Once you are a Facebook member you then need to visit our webpage at <https://www.facebook.com/wvgsor/> Once the page appears to you for the first time you can select the “like” button to receive messages or notices as they are posted to the page by WVGS and other Facebook members.

State Censuses



Genealogists

(This series was started in 2018 up until May 2020, but not finished in the newsletters. The complete list was published in Beaver Briefs.)

NEW MEXICO State, territorial, and colonial censuses

New Mexico took several censuses in the years between the federal censuses. The dates are listed below. State census records may have columns that were different or more unusual than those found on federal censuses. The responses and years of coverage may give additional information on the family.

1885 Federal census of New Mexico Territory.

1845, 1830, 1827, 1826, 1823, 1822, 1816, 1802, 1790, and 1750-- Mexican and Spanish colonial censuses exist. The colonial censuses include the wife's maiden name. These censuses are incomplete and do not include all families in New Mexico.

The colonial censuses are available at The New Mexico Records Center and Archives, The University of New Mexico Library, The Family History Library.

5. Never relies blindly on family stories or online family trees, but searches out a source for each. Verify, verify, verify!

6. Makes an accurate copy of all records found. Carefully notes spelling of names while copying and does not make changes.

7. Keeps a research log of all sources checked, and notes if the search was successful or not.

8. Analyzes each record and document carefully in order to spot clues that may lead to other areas of research and to accurately understand what the record is and is not.

9. Searches siblings of a challenging ancestor in order to find more documents that may hold clues pertaining to his/her ancestor.

10. Leaves no stone (record) unturned. Extends his/her search to records not found online such as in local courthouses or archives.
